Montana Students Eligible for \$10,000 Scholarship and Trip to Washington, D.C.

The United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) and Montana Office of Public Instruction are pleased to announce that Montana high school juniors and seniors are eligible for a \$10,000 college scholarship and all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C to tour our nation's Capital and visit with leaders from all branches of the federal government. Two student delegates from each state will be chosen to participate in this prestigious program from March 7-14, 2020 for the program's 58th annual Washington Week.

The USSYP was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 as stated in supporting Senate testimony from that year, "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationship of the three branches of government, the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

"Civics education is critical to preparing the next generation of Montana leaders," said State Superintendent Elsie Arntzen. "I look forward to nominating robust student leaders to represent our state in the 2020 USSYP Program who will make Montana proud on the national stage."

Each year, this extremely competitive merit-based program brings two high school juniors and seniors from every state, the District of Columbia, and the Department of Defense Education Activity, to Washington, D.C. for an intensive week-long study of the federal government and its leaders. The state departments of education throughout the country select the students through a rigorous nomination and selection process. Each student will also receive a \$10,000 undergraduate college scholarship, with encouragement to continue coursework in history, government, and public affairs. The Hearst Foundations have fully funded and administered the program since inception; no government funds are utilized.

The student delegates will visit Capitol Hill, the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department, the Supreme Court, and many other historic sites in Washington. The program agenda routinely includes meetings with Senators, the President, Cabinet Secretaries, a Justice of the Supreme Court, senior members of the national media, and other key policymakers. Each speaking event incorporates detailed question and answer sessions. This high-level exposure is precisely what fuels and sustains the delegates' commitment to making a difference in their country, communities, and schools.

Reach Higher Montana Dual Enrollment Educator Scholarship Program

Reach Higher Montana aims to increase high school students' access to high quality dual enrollment opportunities by expanding the number of educators eligible to teach courses for college credit, especially in Montana's small communities.

May of 2019 was the first year Reach Higher Montana awarded the Dual Enrollment Educator Scholarship and they encourage anyone interested in this opportunity to apply for the next opportunity in the spring of 2020.

Eligibility is open to educators currently teaching in Montana, preferably in a school classified as Class B or C and be committed to offering dual enrollment course(s) in current school upon completion of educational requirements (Master's degree, plus nine graduate credits in content area for General Education Core; additional education as needed for Career and Technical Education courses). Currently, one scholarship per year is awarded in the amount of up to \$5,000 per year, for two years.

Fun Facts and Trivia

The boysenberry is a cross between a raspberry, a blackberry, and a loganberry.

Ripe boysenberries are purplish black, sometimes mottled with red, and look like blackberries, but are sweeter and more fragile.

Because boysenberries are fragile, they don't travel well; therefore, you are less likely to see them fresh in grocery stores and are easier to find frozen.

Boysenberries were invented in the Napa Valley of California by Swedish immigrant Rudolph Boysen during the Great Depression.

Walter Knott as the first to commercially cultivate boysenberries in Southern California after finding the plant abandoned at Boysen's old farm.

Knott began selling the berries at his farm stand in 1932 and soon noticed that people kept returning to buy the big, tasty berries.

As the popularity of boysenberries grew, Mrs. Knott began making preserves, which ultimately made Knott's Berry Farm famous.

Most commercially grown boysenberries, primarily from Oregon, are processed into other products such as jam, pie, juice, syrup and ice cream.

As of 2016, New Zealand was the world's biggest producer and exporter of boysenberries.

Boysenberries are high in vitamin C and fiber, which helps to reduce the risk of cancer.

Boysenberries are a rich source of anthocyanins, which are natural antioxidants that help maintain healthy brain cells and protect against oxidative damage.

The boysenberry is one of the reasons that Knott's Berry Farm became so famous.

Today, the Knott's' farm is the site of Knott's Berry Farm amusement park; if you visit, you can enjoy berry festivals and treats along with the exciting rides.

The origin of the theme park dates back to the mid-1920s, when Walter Knott and his family began selling berry products at a roadside stand along State Route 39 in California.

By the 1940s, a restaurant, several shops, and other attractions had been constructed on the property to entertain a growing number of visitors, including a replica ghost town.

The site continued its transformation into a modern amusement park over the next two decades, and an admission charge was added in 1968.

The park was sold to Cedar Fair in the late 1990s, and the family's food business was eventually acquired by The J. M. Smucker Company.

In 2017, Knott's Berry Farm was the tenth-most-visited theme park in North America.

Today, Knott's Berry Farm consists of four themed areas: Ghost Town, Fiesta Village, The Boardwalk, and Camp Snoopy.

If you go to Knott's Berry Farm, be sure to stop by Strictly-On-A-Stick and have a hand-dipped Boysenberry Corn Dog--the combination of sweet boysenberry cornbread and savory hot dog create the perfectly fulfilling treat.
