The CTE course and enrollment data in TEAMS is used to create the CTE Participation Reports in the spring. Data from these reports are used to help determine Perkins and State CTE/VoEd funding for the 2020-2021 school year.

Apply Now for the Montana Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program

Through House Bill 211, the 2019 Montana legislature renewed the quality educator loan assistance program as a recruitment and retention aid for rural schools. The Office of Public Instruction is responsible for administering the program. Applications for the [Montana Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program \(opi.mt.gov/Educators/Licensure/Educator-Recruitment-Retention/Quality-Educator-Loan-Assistance-FAQs\)](http://opi.mt.gov/Educators/Licensure/Educator-Recruitment-Retention/Quality-Educator-Loan-Assistance-FAQs) will be accepted from February 13-March 31, 2020.

Newly hired quality educators who teach or work in a subject that has been identified as a “critical quality educator shortage area” at an “impacted school” are eligible to receive state paid loan assistance for up to four years, so long as they remain a full time employee at an impacted school.

The program provides for up to \$3,000 of state funded loan repayment at the end of the first year of teaching, up to \$4,000 at the end of the second year, and up to \$5,000 at the end of the third year. In addition, the school district has the option to offer up to \$5,000 at the end of the fourth year, but this is entirely a local decision.

At the time of application, the quality educator will have to provide the most current loan statement showing the remaining principal balance of the loan. To be eligible, the educational loan must not be in default and the balance must be at least \$1,000. The authorized loan assistance repayment amount will be the lesser of the principal balance or the maximum amount shown above.

By creating strong pathways from K-12 through postsecondary education and workforce development, the strategies outlined in this plan will help ensure that Montana students have robust learning opportunities to gain the skills and education necessary to secure careers in high-wage, high-skill and in-demand jobs.

The final state plan will be submitted to the US Department of Education on April 15, 2020.

Fun Facts and Trivia

The tangerine is actually a variety of the Mandarin Orange, which is native to Southeastern Asia.

The name "tangerine" originates from Tangier, Morocco, that was the port from which the very first batches of the tangerine fruit were shipped from Tangier, Morocco, or Southeast Asia to Europe.

Tangerines have been cultivated for over three thousand years in counties like Japan and China.

Tangerines did not arrive in the US until the mid-nineteenth century.

The first batch of tangerines was brought to America when the Italian consul in New Orleans decided to plant it on the grounds surrounding the consulate.

From New Orleans, the tangerine was taken to Florida and it became a commercial crop like other citrus fruits.

Florida has become famous for their production of oranges as well as tangerines.

China produces more tangerines than any other country.

Spain, Brazil, and Turkey are also large producers of tangerines.

In the United States, California is top in tangerine production, followed by Florida.

Tangerines are known for their bright orange peel, which is usually much more vibrant than the peel of an orange.

The peak season for tangerines is between December and January.

In order to make your tangerines last longer store them in a cool, dry place or in the refrigerator.

Tangerines are low in calories but high in healthy nutrients like Vitamin C, Vitamin A, calcium, potassium, and fiber.

One medium tangerine has about 37 calories and provide 31% of the recommended daily amount of vitamin C.

Very often, tangerines are simply peeled and eaten by hand, but they are sometimes also used as an ingredient of salads.

Tangerine peels are used fresh or dried as a spice or zest for baking and drinks and eaten coated in chocolate.

In Sichuan cuisine, the dried peel of tangerines is used as an ingredient.

There are several varieties of tangerines in wide production today including the Honey tangerine, the Sunburst tangerine, the Robinson tangerine, the Fallglo tangerine, and the Fairchild tangerine.

Clementines are sometimes considered as alternatives to tangerines.
