# **Applications for 2022-2023 Perkins Rural Reserve Grants Now Open**

Applications for the Montana Perkins Secondary Rural Reserve Grant can be submitted for the 2022-2023 grant cycle. The purpose of this year's Montana Perkins Secondary Rural Reserve grant is to create career awareness, recruit, and retain students within a CTE Secondary Program of Study that leads to a high skill, high wage, or in-demand occupations.

There are currently 176 schools offering over 260 Career and Technical Education courses to students in grades 5-8 in our Montana schools. The most offered course is in career exploration. Since Montana does not receive enough funding to allow us to provide Perkins funding for middle school programs this year's Rural Reserve Grant will be to encourage pathway work for the middle grades.

Schools could use the funds to help:

- --establish innovative delivery methods for career exploration
- --expose students to employability skills earlier
- --establish foundational elements for work-based learning
- --improve transitions from middle grades into secondary Career and Technical Education pathways.

<u>Grants</u> of up to \$5,000 each will be available to secondary Perkins eligible school districts to support CTE work in the middle grades (5-8). Schools will have had to complete the Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA), and their E-Grant application must be approved for the 2022-2023 Grant cycle before applying.

Schools that were awarded in previous years are eligible to apply, however, preference will be given to new applicants. The 2022-2023 application can be downloaded from the <a href="CTE page">CTE page</a> of the OPI website under the Funding menu.

### <u>Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program</u>

As an employee of a local public and/or private school system, you may qualify for the <u>Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) Program</u>. PSLF is a federal program that forgives the remaining balance on direct loans after 120 qualifying monthly payments under a qualifying repayment plan while an individual is working full-time for a qualifying employer.

Last year, the U.S. Department of Education announced a time-limited waiver to allow borrowers to receive credit for past periods of repayment that would otherwise not qualify for loan forgiveness. Under the temporary waiver, any prior period of repayment counts as a qualifying payment, regardless of loan program, repayment plan, or whether the payment was made in full or on time, provided the employment requirements are satisfied.

The waiver is only available for a limited time. The deadline to submit the <u>PSLF Application</u> for the waiver is October 31, 2022. Individual employees are responsible for submitting all necessary forms to the U.S. Department of Education. Requests for employment certification should be directed to campus human resources.

Computer Science Discoveries is a hands-on introductory course for grades 6-10.

This virtual course is being provided by Code.org regional partner AVID and will be led by Washington-based facilitators in both a synchronous/asynchronous blend. The course is open to Montana educators on a first-come, first-serve basis; however, scholarships for Montana educators are currently not available. The cost to complete the course is \$1500.

### **Fun Facts & Trivia**

Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs premiered on December 21, 1937, at the Carthay Circle Theater in Hollywood, it was the first animated feature film.

The film cost \$1.4 million and featured such classic songs as "Some Day My Prince Will Come," Heigh Ho," and "Whistle While You Work."

More than 750 artists worked on the film, which took three years to produce.

Of the many who auditioned for the voice of Snow White, Walt Disney chose the young singer Adriana Caselotti.

Harry Stockwell, the father of Dean Stockwell, did the voice of the Prince.

Pinto Colvig, who was the original voice of Goofy, was the voice of Sleepy.

Some animators were opposed to the name Dopey, claiming that it was too modern a word to use in a timeless fairy tale.

Walt Disney made the argument that William Shakespeare used the word in one of his plays.

While this managed to convince everyone, any reference to the term "dopey" is yet to be found in any of Shakespeare's work.

The original names of the Dwarfs, before Disney renamed them, were Snick, Glick, Blick, Flick, Plick, Whick and Quee.

Walt had gotten the idea for the film when he was a newsboy in Kansas City, and he saw a major presentation of a silent film version of the story starring Marguerite Clark.

The screening was held at the city's Convention Hall in February 1917, and the film was projected onto a four-sided screen using four separate projectors.

The movie made a tremendous impression on the 15-year-old viewer because he was sitting where he could see two sides of the screen at once, and they were not quite in sync.

The film received a special Academy Award in 1939 consisting of one full-size Oscar and seven dwarf Oscars, presented to Walt Disney by Shirley Temple.

For a while after its release, the film became the highest-grossing motion picture of all time, until finally surpassed by *Gone With the Wind* a couple of years later.

The original worldwide gross was \$8.5 million, a figure that would translate into several hundreds of millions in today's dollars.

In England, the film was deemed too scary for children, and those under 16 had to be accompanied by a parent.

For its 1993 reissue the film was completely restored, being the first ever to be completely digitized by computer, cleaned up, and then printed back to film.

For those familiar with Disney's "hidden Mickey" campaign, there is a hidden Mickey formed by three stones on the wall behind the Queen as she strides down to the basement to perform her spell.
