Perkins Fall CTE Data Collection Due December 31, 2023

The fall is the time to contact graduates of the Class of 2023 identified as CTE Concentrators to determine and report their post-graduation placement.

Graduates are identified by one of the following post-graduation status categories.

--Post-secondary Education or Training: attended(ing) a post-secondary program or additional training

- --Employed: currently employed, not enrolled in a post-secondary program or in the military
- --Unemployed: after graduating, student became/remains unemployed
- --Military: student joined the military
- --Not Known: student's status after graduating from high school is not known

--Other: student's status after graduating from high school is something other than above options

For assistance in completing the data collection, a <u>User Guide</u> is available for entering the data in AIM.

Applications Now Being Accepted for Perkins Rural Reserve Grants for 2023-2024

Purpose: To create career awareness, recruit, and retain students within a CTE Secondary Program of Study that leads to a high skill, high wage, or in demand occupations.

There are currently 176 schools offering over 260 Career and Technical Education courses to students in grades 5-8 in our Montana schools. The most offered course is in career exploration. Montana does not allocate Perkins's funding for middle school programs this year's Rural Reserve Grant will be to encourage pathway work for the middle grades.

Schools could use the funds to help:

--establish innovative delivery methods for career exploration,

- --expose students to employability skills earlier,
- --establish foundational elements for work-based learning,

--improve transitions from middle grades into secondary Career and Technical Education pathways.

High School Awards: Grants of **up to \$5,000** each will be available to secondary Perkins eligible: school districts who receive less than \$15,000 in Perkins funding Schools will have had to complete the Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA) and E-Grant application as well.

Middle School Awards: Grants of **up to \$5,000** each will be available to secondary Perkins eligible school districts to support CTE work in the middle grades (5-8). Schools will have to complete the

Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA) and E-Grant application as well for the 2023-2024 Grant cycle. Middle School programs will need to apply through their high school district to submit the application.

Districts are only eligible for a total of \$5,000 in awards, must have completed the Perkins Grant Application for Fiscal Year 24 and receive an allocation of less than \$15,000. Grant winners notified on an ongoing basis. First reviews will be January 2, 2024.

Use of Funds: Applicants need to show a middle school/ secondary program partnership. Money will be granted to the Secondary Program to use for Middle School CTE Development/Support.

The Carl D. Perkins Act is federal legislation that provides funding for the specific purpose of developing career and technical education training and employability skills for secondary (high school) and postsecondary (college) students.

The State of Montana is asking you for your help in developing the state's vision and goals for career and technical education and workforce training. This <u>survey</u> will take five minutes or less to complete.

Fun Facts & Trivia

Glacier Bay National Park is located on the Southeast Alaska coast, about 65 air miles northwest of Juneau.

Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve can be reached only by boat or by plane.

Glacier Bay became a National Monument on February 25, 1925, and was established as a national park and preserve on December 2, 1980.

It was designated Wilderness on December 2, 1980, designated a Biosphere Reserve in 1986, and a World Heritage Site in 1992.

World-famous Scottish-American mountaineer John Muir is credited as the first naturalist to visit the park, perform research, and share the discovery with the rest of the world.

Muir first came to Glacier Bay in 1879, led by the local Tlingit guides who traced their ancestors back to the region, in order to study the movement of glaciers.

After writing about the beautiful landscape and wildlife he found, Glacier Bay began to attract tourism and scientific attention during the late 1880s and 1890s.

The father of Glacier Bay National Park was William Skinner Cooper, an ecologist from the University of Minnesota.

Mr. Cooper studied the plants that first began growing in the rocky, barren soils uncovered by the retreating glaciers.

William Cooper's plant studies impressed the Ecological Society of America.

Eventually with the society's help Cooper convinced President Calvin Coolidge to proclaim Glacier Bay as a national monument in 1925.

The park encompasses a total area of 3,280,198 acres, making it larger than the entire U.S. state of Connecticut.

The elevation changes from 0 feet on the Pacific Ocean all the way up to 15,266 feet on Mount Fairweather, one of the tallest mountains in the United States, which also marks the border between Alaska and Canada.

The fjord making up the majority of the park was covered by the 40-mile-wide Grand Pacific Glacier as recently as 200 years ago.

Today, 27% of the entire park is covered by ice.

In 1992, the park received greater protection on its northern boundary when the Alsek-Tatshenshini Park in Canada was formed.

This new park joined Glacier Bay National Park and Wrangell-St. Elias National Park in Alaska and Kluane National Park in Canada to create the largest internationally protected area in the world.

Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve commands a glacier-crowned, maritime wilderness that stretches northward from Alaska's inside passage to the Alsek River, encircling a magnificent saltwater bay.

The 3.3-million-acre park derives its name and much of its biological and cultural significance from this great bay, which harbors spectacular tidewater glaciers and a unique assemblage of marine and terrestrial life.

To the south and east, the landscape fragments into the timbered islands and winding fjords of the Alexander Archipelago and the Tongass National Forest.

To the west, the Park's pristine outer coast opens to the Gulf of Alaska, and beyond to the Pacific Ocean and Asia.

To the north, the St. Elias Mountains reach across the new Tatshenshini-Alsek Provincial Park (British Columbia) to connect two more vast protected areas; Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve in Alaska and Kluane National Park in Canada.

A mountain-guarded, maritime sanctuary, Glacier Bay National Park thus secures the coastal flank of the largest internationally protected area on earth.
